To whom it may concern,

I have been President of the International Statistical Institute (ISI) from September 1987 to September 1989. Prior to that I served for two years as acting President of the Institute.

During this period it was my duty to find a Director for the Institute's activities upon the retirement of the previous incumbent after decades of service. My world wide search identified Dr. Carlos Jarque as a potentially well qualified candidate. Before appointing him, I asked for and received numerous references from Mexico, the United States, United Kingdom, France and Australia. The references, from world famous statisticians and experienced administrators, unequivocally described Dr. Jarque as a truly exceptional person. On that basis the Executive Committee of ISI appointed him to the post.

At the time the Institute was in deep trouble. It had previously launched a research program which was to be self-sufficient but in fact was losing money at a rate which in a short period of time would have bankrupted us. The development of new programs was sorely deficient; the accounting system was operating on a cash flow basis, hiding serious future liabilities; office systems were running on an antiquated word processing machine (since broken down); staff morale was low; the head of the research program had left a few months earlier.

In the miraculously short time of about one year Dr. Jarque turned the situation around completely. He succeeded in reducing the office staff by close to 50% (no mean feet in the face of Dutch labour law), had each of the remaining staff accept extra duties in good spirit, eliminated all other non-essential expenditure, generated a surplus or break-even on the Institute's numerous programs (research, administration, education, publishing), reorganized the office, represented the Institute in correspondence and on numerous international meetings (both scientific and with donor agencies), revitalized the scientific program, automated office operations. In summary, he completely turned around the Institute's situation.

Such an accomplishment would be wonderful if achieved over five years; it is truly exceptional when carried out in little over one year - with good morale being maintained in the office throughout the period.

Dr. Jarque is obviously very hard working. But he also possesses outstanding administrative qualities, creativity, good judgement in separating important from less important issues, leadership ability, and excellent interpersonal skills.
